Money Available to Make Home Repairs

The Borough of Glassboro offers low to moderate income homeowners the opportunity to apply for a \$20,000 Regional Contribution Agreement (RCA) grant to make health and safety repairs to their home.

Income eligibility limits cannot exceed:

- 1 person - \$43,568
- 2 people - \$49,792
- 3 people - \$56,016
- 4 people - \$62,240
- 5 people - \$67,219

Also, at least \$10,000 must be used for a major system repair, like a new roof, windows, siding, heating system, etc. The balance can be used for other health and safety repairs.

The funding is provided through the Council on Affordable Housing. Any Glassboro resident interested in applying for the RCA program can obtain an application at the Glassboro Economic Development Office located at 11 N. Main Street or call 856-881-0500 for more information.

STUDENT HOUSING

For anyone passing through Glassboro's downtown, it is quite impressive. The first phase of the Rowan Student housing is complete and students are moved in. The building consists of 560 beds. Each apartment has four bedrooms, two baths, a kitchen and living room. The ribbon cutting for the facility took place on Friday, August 28 and construction for the second student housing unit has already begun. It should be completed by June 2010 and that unit will consist of 324 beds.

2009 SMART GROWTH AWARD

On June 3, 2009, Glassboro's Mayor McCabe, joined Rowan University's President Don Farish and Master Redeveloper Greg Filipek as they accepted the 2009 Smart Growth Award for Community-University Partnership.

This prestigious award is given to projects that, as quoted by Executive Director of New Jersey Future Peter Kasabach: "...for charting a new course towards smart growth and redevelopment in the Garden state. The winners of these awards are outstanding examples of the kind of creativity, dynamic and forward-thinking leadership that will revitalize New Jersey's downtown, provide more housing and transportation choices, protect our environment and generate robust economic growth."

BARNES & NOBLE GROUNDBREAKING

Then on August 5, 2009 the groundbreaking for the 36,000 sf Barnes & Noble Superstore took place on site. Senators Steve Sweeney and Fred Madden, along with Assemblyman Paul Moriarty and Assemblywoman Sandra Love joined Mayor McCabe and several council members as they put shovels in the ground alongside Barnes & Noble College Booksellers' President, Max Roberts, for the first Rowan Blvd. retailer.

Council President Tony Fiola states: "Today was truly monumental. The student housing buildings are behind us completed and we are breaking ground on the Barnes & Noble on Rowan Blvd. It almost seems surreal. It is actually happening just like we planned and I personally couldn't be prouder."

The bookstore will sell its standard full line of bestseller books, publications, periodicals, music and media along with new and used textbooks and Rowan gear and apparel.

Within the facility, a 6000 sq ft Starbucks will occupy a section of the first floor and include an outdoor patio and separate entrance to accommodate late night customers.

THE ROUND-ABOUT

As most of the residents and business owners know, Route 322 was closed the majority of the summer. Then on August 24, the Borough reopened the road with the new addition of a round-about. So everyone wants to know what a round-about is. . . Round-abouts force vehicles to slow down or stop as they enter the intersection whereas; traffic entering circles have the right-of-way.

There are studies indicating that the safety of a round-about intersection is improved up to 75% for vehicle damages and over 90% for critical person injuries. There are also claims that roundabouts provide for a "greener" operation because there is less stopping and going of vehicles giving off less emissions and reduced noise pollution.

According to Councilman, George Cossabone: "Safety is our first priority when it comes to our residents and motorists traveling through our community. We knew we couldn't put up a traffic light so we had to do something. After researching roundabouts along with our master redeveloper and Rowan University, Mayor and Council felt very comfortable with this choice and we are grateful to NJDOT for their financial support to help construct the intersection."

WHAT'S AHEAD?

As the Borough moves ahead with the downtown redevelopment, a groundbreaking for the new Let's Dance Studio took place on September 24. They will be more than doubling the size of their facility to 16,000 sf and adding several new programs to their offerings.

Councilman George Cossabone states: "It is really nice to see that a longtime, family owned business is making this kind of investment in the town's redevelopment project. It just goes to show that many people believe in this project and are excited to be a part of it."

The actual Boulevard roadway will be completed by the end of the year and the construction for the hotel conference center is scheduled to start in the first half of 2010.

ADDITIONAL DOWNTOWN REDEVELOPMENT FACTS

- Remember the previously-existing depressed, absentee landlord-controlled area in the center of town? That is being replaced by a new, vibrant and productive Downtown with commercial, business and recreational destinations!
- Prior to starting the Downtown Redevelopment project, extensive marketing and demographic research was performed revealing that Glassboro could be a prime area for development of a new Downtown.
- The Borough entered into a Master Redevelopment Agreement with SORA Holdings, LLC, the master developer, for the construction of a hotel, a Barnes & Noble bookstore, mixed retail, office and residential use, and student housing for Rowan University.
- SORA is investing \$300 million in private funds to develop Downtown Glassboro
- The Redevelopment Agreement requires SORA to purchase the properties needed for each phase of the project from the Borough, and to pay necessary fees and costs associated with development.
- These payments are structured to cover the carrying costs of the project's debt each year and to pay off that debt by the end of the project. **This ensures that each budget year will not be affected by the development's costs and places no impact on property taxes.**
- Prior to the redevelopment, the Rowan Boulevard area was only collecting approximately \$250,000 in property taxes, when completed the will generate at least 7x that amount.
- For example, the area of the completed student housing generated **\$74,265** in tax revenue prior to redevelopment. That area will now generate **\$523,767** in tax revenue in 2010, even with the "special financial agreement" (or "tax abatement") with SORA.
- In order to assure the successful completion of the project, SORA has requested a long-term "special financial agreement" with the Borough. This agreement allows the private developer to invest its resources into the project and allows the Borough to collect the development costs and increase tax revenues on developed properties from the developer. Without such an agreement, redevelopment of the Downtown would be financially impossible, especially in present economic conditions.

Glassboro's Police Department Update

Glassboro Police Department's Crime Prevention Series

This past fall, the Glassboro Police Department initiated a series of Crime Prevention meetings for residents, business and property owners. They have held five (5) successful program that focused on such issues as: security, the initiation of the Crime Free Multi Housing Program, Gang Violence and graffiti and crime prevention for persons with disabilities.

The Glassboro Police Department has done extensive research on all the subjects they present and want to educate Glassboro residents, as well as County residents, how everyone plays a role in crime prevention on all levels within their community.

According to Chief Fanfarillo: "It is our job to ensure that all citizens are provided the tools to stay safe and feel safe in our town. In some cases, all of us do things or put ourselves in situations that we don't think will be harmful but are."

Council President Tony Fiola states: "We are not asking residents to become law enforcement agents. We are asking people to become better neighbors and citizens and help spread the word on how to keep our towns safe and ways to be more aware of their surroundings so fewer crimes are committed. We want people to be proactive instead of being reactive when it is too late."

Lost Children Patrol Car Awareness Program

In August of this year, the Glassboro Police department partnered with the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children (NCMEC) and the Morgan Nick Foundation to start a program to post photographs of missing children and young adults on the rear windshield of five patrol cars.

Two official photographs of missing or exploited children are being displayed in each of the five cars for a total of ten different missing persons on display. There will be at least two patrol cars on the road with the display during each shift.

Statistics show that one in six missing persons are recovered as a result of someone recognizing these photographs.

Councilman George Cossabone states: "Mayor and Council are very proud to be a part of this program. If we can help to find just one missing person we did a great thing. Kudos to Chief Alex Fanfarillo for initiating the project here in Glassboro."

Message from the NJ Office of Emergency Management (NJOEM)

Plastic Recycling Made Easy

The Glassboro Highway Department would like to simplify the message to all residents concerning plastic bottle and jar recycling. Glassboro now accepts all plastic bottles and jars including: Soda, Milk, water, juice, syrup, ketchup, cooking oils, jars like peanut butter, dish soap, household cleaners, shampoo, conditioner, lotions, mouth wash, hair spray, laundry detergents, bleach, fabric softener, and the like. Residents must empty the contents in the bottle or jar, wash out, flatten and place into the Blue Cart.

Recycled plastics are turned into many useful products. For example, soda bottles are recycled into carpet, fleece, pillow stuffing, a t-shirt, or a new plastic container. Milk jugs are recycled into plastic lumber used to make decks or park benches. Buying recycled products completes the recycling triangle.

When making your next purchase, look for items that contain post consumer materials. That means that it is made of materials collected from residential recycling programs like ours. So please remember to recycle and buy recycled.

Glassboro's Single Stream Recycling includes: Plastic bottles and jars, glass bottles and jars, aluminum and tin cans, cardboard, and all types of paper, which all go into the Blue Cart.

The following items should NOT be placed in the Blue cart: toys, medical supplies, bags, film, wraps, large items, pots and garden items, pails, food storage containers, Tupperware, pesticides, paints, solvents, or adhesives.
