The Borough Breaks Ground For Rowan Boulevard Roadway

GLASSBORO
The opportunity is clear.

On March 16, 2009, U.S. Representative Rob Andrews joined county and local officials to break ground for the roadway construction on the new Rowan Boulevard project.

The boulevard will feature broad sidewalks, dozens of stores, restaurants, mixed use buildings, a hotel-conference center, public piazzas and a town square.

"Rowan Boulevard is exemplary of what can be accomplished when government and private enterprise work together for the betterment of the community. This project is a model of success in how to reenergize a downtown, revitalize a business district, create hundreds of jobs and generate long term economic growth, which is essential in today's struggling nationwide economy," said U.S. Representative Rob Andrews.

The vision is to transform the downtown into the quintessential college town, creating a direct link with a yet untapped retail market available from more than 12,500 students and staff at Rowan University, and with it enliven Glassboro's downtown with an infusion of new businesses, residences, culture and recreation.

"This has been a process of thorough communication, collaboration, hard work and planning. As a result, we forged a plan as a community, and we are now beginning to savor the success of making Glassboro's vision become a reality", states Council President Tony Fiola.

The principals of Sora Holdings, LLC, the master redeveloper of the project, refer to the plan as 'rebuilding the future'. In doing so, Glassboro will be able to capture an estimated \$425 million in regional sales currently going elsewhere.

"We're creating a downtown that works in today's world. We're not just replacing old buildings, we're recreating a downtown that is a community. It will be vibrant and alive, having everything that people use and need within a few steps of everyone who lives and works there," states Councilman George Cossabone.

The project is being funded by several sources. NJDOT-through the support of Congressman Rob Andrews is providing \$3

million that was obtained through a grant secured by the Borough. Rowan University has committed to donating \$1 million to the downtown redevelopment project and the master redeveloper will invest over \$300 million to the Rowan Blvd. project. The Borough of Glassboro has purchased the properties to maintain control of the sites. The Borough will sell the properties to the redeveloper and will recapture all costs.

The JGSC Group, of Merchantville, NJ, conducted a comprehensive Community Insights™ study of Glassboro's downtown to analyze the market and determine specific, viable strategies to revitalize its older retail districts and stimulate economic growth so, the plan is based on facts.

More than 3,300 residents, shoppers and students including Rowan students, staff and faculty, were surveyed for the study to pinpoint their preferences and needs. The survey information was combined with public outreach meetings and interviews of local businesses, organizations and public officials, and with economic data on the area measuring the demand for retail stores and restaurants, as well as desire for public amenities, events and activities.

ROWAN BOULEVARD

The Rowan Boulevard District will host a 107-room Holiday Inn Express & Suites and conference center which will offer banquet facilities for 300 guests and may be used for a university hospitality management educational program. A 5,000 SF restaurant will be located adjacent to the hotel. The boulevard will also host a 36,000 SF Barnes & Noble, which received site plan approvals in December, 2008, serving both the university and public, complete with a 6,000SF Starbucks Café.

Behind the hotel, construction has begun on four-story, apartment-style housing to accommodate 884 students, providing immediate access to both downtown and Rowan's campus.

Five, four-story mixed use buildings with a total of 40,000 SF of office space, 185,000 SF of retail space and 307,000 SF of residential space will line the boulevard and include the construction of 340 residential condominiums above retail stores and 46 upscale townhomes. More than a dozen restaurants are expected to locate along the boulevard and throughout downtown, with plans for ethnic restaurants, seafood, a steakhouse, sandwich shops, pubs and taverns.

WEST HIGH STREET-Neighborhood retail and service area

Glassboro's West High Street District, to the immediate south of Rowan Boulevard, is being transformed into a neighborhood retail corridor where residents can shop for their daily needs, run their errands and meet neighbors, patronizing local venues such as a grocery store, bakery, post office, barber shop, beauty salon, pharmacy, coffee shop, and more. The district also includes Summit Square, a new 51-townhouse development along Lake and Poplar Streets. For more information about the townhouses visit: dcorphomes.com.

"One of our goals is to help reduce emissions by creating a walkable community. The West High Street neighborhood will accommodate all the residents within walking distance east to west from Whitney to Delsea Drive and north to south from Rt 322 to Grove Street. This benefits so many more people than just the redevelopment area", states Councilman George Cossabone.

EAST HIGH STREET-The arts and entertainment district

On East High Street, from Academy Street to Rt. 47/Delsea Drive, is Glassboro's Entertainment District, which will feature a cluster of mixed use

Glassboro Holds Crime Prevention Meetings

On Saturday, March 7, 2009 Glassboro's Police Department held its second public presentation in a series of Crime Prevention meetings scheduled for this year.

Police Chief Alex Fanfarillo, Sergeant First Class Edwin Alicea, Lt. Bill Highley and Officer Chuck Williams provided many safety tips for residents. They also introduced a new email address to give citizens a direct link to Sergeant Alicea who is the official face of Glassboro's Crime Prevention program: CrimePrevention@glassboro.org.

The March 7 meeting included a presentation by Joe Neally from the Gloucester County RoamSecure program that immediately contacts a subscriber during a major crisis or emergency that is happening in the county. The alert can be sent to e-mail accounts, cell phones, text pagers, Blackberry phones, Palm Pilots and PDAs. To apply to the system visit: www.gloucesteralert.com and follow the step by step directions to register.

In addition, Gus Menerey from Abbott's Hardware educated the audience on how certain locks work and their efficiency and brought many different security samples to show the group.

Council President Tony Fiola, who was also present at the meeting states: "These meetings really help to establish a great relationship between the Police Department and our citizens. They encourage everyone to be mindful of everything around them and stress that we all play a role in helping to make the town safer."

to meet the three directives. An ordinance was also passed to set the standards for watering lawns and fines to be imposed for residents that don't comply.

Residents are restricted from watering their lawns to specific days of the week. Odd numbered residents can only water their lawns on odd numbered days and even numbered residents can only water their lawns on even numbered days.

Councilman George Cossabone states: "We don't want our residents to be alarmed-Glassboro's water is safe to drink! We just want residents to be more conscientious about their water usage because the more water we use on non drinking and cooking uses, increases the amount of water the Borough has to purchase which impacts local water bills. In order to keep the cost of water reasonable, Glassboro has to start to conserve its water supply until we build the water treatment system."

Glassboro annually sends all residents an Annual Drinking Water Quality Report, which is available at www.glassborolonline.com. The report informs residents about the quality of the water and services delivered daily. The report is created based on the annual NJDEP Source Water Assessment Report and Summary, which requires the Borough to monitor its drinking water for over 80 contaminants.

Council President Tony Fiola states: "We are proud of the fact that Glassboro's drinking water has consistently met all federal and state safety standards and continues to meet federal standards. We are in the same boat as many other communities in New Jersey trying to accommodate the new standards and we will do everything we can to ensure that our water remains safe and within all state required levels."

buildings with entertainment related retail at street level and office uses on the upper floors, forming a shared environment where office workers can use the parking lots and support area retail stores and restaurants during the daytime, and providing parking for entertainment-seekers on weeknights and weekends. Plans call for a performing arts center with a 500-800 seat live performance theater hosting as many as 150 performances annually, along with smaller black-box theaters and rehearsal/meeting rooms, as well as entertainment-related businesses occupying the office space and back-lot areas behind the theater. It can also serve as a community center during non-theater hours and may also host Rowan University theater-related classrooms. The district will further offer nightclubs, taverns, pubs, entertainment-related retail, a sports/recreation center and a movie theater with two to three screens.

Extending along both sides of High Street running from Main to Academy is Glassboro's Arts District, the site of studios, galleries and arts and crafts retail. The ground floor properties are expected to be artist studios, art galleries, jewelry stores, boutiques and other specialty retail uses. Recently, a local property owner donated space to create Rowan's satellite Art Gallery, located at 11 East High Street. The space is used to display the works of Rowan University students and staff.

AND THERE'S MORE

In the center of downtown, at the southern edge of Rowan Boulevard, old buildings and a closed gas station are being transformed into a one and a half acre town square.

A feasibility study has been completed and a RFP issued for the architect of a new larger library downtown. In addition, there are several plans in the works for Center Street, including converting it into an 18,000 SF public piazza. Restaurants with outdoor dining will flank the piazza, which will host community events and activities providing ongoing lunch hour entertainment, and kiosks will dot the piazza as part of a Retail Incubator.

And finally to tie it all together, a feasibility study is investigating establishing a trolley system to loop throughout downtown and link with parking areas and the university, connecting the various neighborhoods and promoting pedestrian circulation.

As envisioned by Mayor and Council, SORA and Rowan University, at completion, Glassboro's revitalization will be brimming not just with new businesses, but with the people who are bringing it alive, establishing a renewed social and cultural identity with a feeling of community and interactivity among everyone who lives, works, studies and visits here.

Route 322 Temporarily Closed

As the Borough starts the construction of Rowan Blvd., Rt. 322 from the corner of Bowe Blvd. to the corner of Main St., will be temporarily closed to all local traffic. There are signs posted around the streets that surround the site redirecting traffic to detours. The roadway construction started on March 23, 2009 and is expected to be completed, and Rt. 322 reopened, within 90 days.

Glassboro To Build A Reverse Osmosis Treatment System

Over the years the Borough along with many other communities throughout the state have been upgrading their local water systems and purchasing water through private companies to accommodate community needs. Currently, Glassboro purchases water from New Jersey American Water Company (NJAWC), and accesses water through eight (8) production wells four (4) from the Potomac Raritan Magothy (PRM) aquifer.

Glassboro's drinking water continues to meet all federal standards and is well below the federal level of 250 ppm (parts per million) for sodium.

However, New Jersey's Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP) requires a more stringent drinking water standard and the Borough and several NJ communities with safe drinking water, will still have to make changes to the PRM wells to meet the standard of only 50 ppm.

The NJDEP has requested that the Borough: 1. purchase more water from NJAWC, 2. implement water use restrictions for watering lawns and 3. only use the PRM aquifer wells as a last resort until a reverse osmosis treatment system is constructed.

A reverse osmosis treatment system will lower the sodium levels in the drinking water to the new acceptable levels required by the NJDEP and will create a significant savings to the Borough by eliminating the need to purchase water. Glassboro's osmosis treatment system is scheduled to be completed in 2011.

At the December 30, 2008 Glassboro Council meeting, a resolution was passed to comply with the DEP orders. The resolution includes the timeline for the Borough

A Review of Glassboro's Recycling Programs

SINGLE STREAM RECYCLING

It has been one year since Glassboro started Single Stream recycling. Resident participation is good and most residents are using their blue carts. In 2008, the single stream recycling system increased Glassboro's recycling tonnage by 65 tons and decreased the trash tonnage by 605 tons but there is still room for improvement. Residents should remember that for each ton recycled saves \$82.32 in tipping fees.

Each day, the Highway Superintendent and/ or the Foreman check the trash and recycling that residents are putting out. There are still some residents that are mixing recycling in their trash, specifically paper and cardboard. Cardboard boxes should be crushed or cut to fit into the blue cart. Cardboard boxes that are too large can be placed next to the cart. Residents should keep a space of three to four feet between carts so the one arm trucks can make the collection.

RECYCLE BANK

The RecycleBank rewards program is going well. Residents can use their recycle points to get coupons from several stores in Glassboro and the surrounding area. Some residents still have not signed up for the rewards program. To sign up to receive RecycleBank points call 1-888-727-2978.

E-WASTE

The E-waste program started in November 2008 has generated over 17,000 pounds to date. Residents can place their electronic items out for collection on their regular trash day. To see how we are doing go to www.thanksforbeinggreen.com.
